The FWSO is honored to welcome guest conductors Peter Oundjian and Markus Stenz and will present a world premiere of a violin concerto by Michael Gandolfi featuring beloved Concertmaster Michael Shih.

FWSO will continue to expand its Pops Series programming, including fan-favorite film concerts such as Disney's *The Lion King* in concert. Other popular Pops concerts will include legendary music eras with REWIND: Music of the 80s and a special nod to country music and art with Wild West Rodeo in collaboration with the Sid Richardson Museum. There will be plenty of variety as always with the popular Pops Series programs.

This season will feature some special concerts that audiences are sure to love. Some of the hottest films with live orchestra include *Jurassic Park* and Elf in concert. The season will culminate with a not-to-be-missed Gala concert, featuring the extraordinary Gil Shaham with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra.

Opening Weekend: Brahms Fourth and Grieg's Piano Concerto September 5-7, 2025

The great composer Johannes Brahms' last public appearance was for a concert of his fourth and final symphony. Listeners leapt to their feet to give a standing ovation after every movement of this rich, dense, *sensitive* culmination of Brahms' career. To open its season, the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra will perform Jean Sibelius' patriotic *Finlandia*, a work protesting Russian censorship with a glorious hymn, before continuing with another Nordic masterpiece, Edvard Grieg's famous Piano Concerto.

British composer Joby Talbot has composed music for the stage and screen alike, with films like *Sing*, *Sing 2*, and *Wonka* with Timothée Chalamet under his belt. In September, a troupe of ballet dancers joins the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra to bring Talbot's celebrated musical interpretation of Lewis Carrol's *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* to life in Bass Performance Hall. The orchestra opens the concert with Mozart's famous "Prague" Symphony, so named for the exceptional wind players of Bohemia for whom Mozart penned the piece.

### Mozart and Mahler's Fourth November 21-23, 2025

Austrian composer Gustav Mahler's Symphony No. 4 presents a musical interpretation of heaven. Sleighbells and flutes open the symphony with a delicate chiming, and later, the angelic voice of a soprano arrives in the final movement to sing texts from Mahler's favorite book of German poetry. To balance out the program, British conductor Jane Glover makes her debut as FWSO's Principal Guest conductor with pianist Imogen Cooper in Mozart's final piano concerto, No. 27 in B-flat Major, and soprano Lauren Snouffer sings the ever-delightful *Exsultate*, *jubilate*.

Debussy captures the power and essence of the sea in his fluid *La mer*, inspired by his childhood memories of the ocean and different painters' interpretations. Next, Ravel's *Pavane for a Dead Princess* invokes a courtly Italian dance, a slow, stately affair also inspired by historic paintings, while the finale of Chopin's Piano Concerto No. 2 — the first he wrote, but the second he published — boasts an earthy, bravura charm. The concert concludes with another French work, Berlioz' aching "Love Scene" from his dramatic symphony *Romeo and Juliet*.

Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra Principal Clarinet Stas Chernyshev joins Principal Bassoon Joshua Elmore for the Duet-Concertino by Richard Strauss, who gave the music the following program: "A dancing princess is alarmed by the grotesque cavorting of a bear... she is won over to the creature and dances with it, upon which it turns into a prince..." The concert begins with Felix Mendelssohn's *Calm Sea* and *Prosperous Voyage*, which begins with a meditative passage followed by an adventurous allegro, and the program concludes with Schumann's optimistic second symphony.

Meanwhile, Prokofiev's militant take on the Montagues and Capulets provides an exquisite contrast to the lushness of his love theme for *Romeo and Juliet*. Don't miss this special weekend of musical drama and intrigue when members of the Dallas Theater Center join the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra to bring the world of The Bard to life.

Beethoven's fourth symphony is a pure distillation of classical form, an artist demonstrating complete mastery of his craft. After a tense introduction, the symphony takes flight with a brilliant, optimistic passage. This good humor continues through the finale, with its famous chortling woodwind solos, which

Beethoven himself described as "unbuttoned" music due to its casual wit. The concert opens with British composer Benjamin Britten's Four Sea Interludes from *Peter Grimes*, musical pictures of the sea at different times of day, and Haydn's Sinfonia Concertante, a concerto for four musicians performed by FWSO players as soloists.

Spanish Masters: An Evening of Music and Art April 24-26, 2026

The ballet *The Three-Cornered Hat* chronicles a magistrate's attempt to seduce a miller's faithful wife with a lightly spiced score of colorful orchestral dances drawn from Andalusian folk music by Spanish composer Manuel de Falla. For this special performance, the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra has partnered with the Kimbell Art Museum to project exquisite Spanish masterpieces during the concert, which also features Ravel's *Rapsodie espagnole* and the incomparable mezzo Kelley O'Connor singing American composer Peter Lieberson's *Neruda Songs*, drawn from the poetry of Pablo Neruda.

While writing his Cello Concerto, the Czech composer Dvořák received word that a dear friend was dying. He immortalized her with a musical quotation of her favorite song, one of his own tunes, in the concerto's second movement, one of music's great love letters, and perhaps the most popular cello concerto in the repertoire. The acclaimed Canadian conductor Peter Oundjian conducts this program, which opens with a brand-new orchestral work by the Grammy-winning American composer Joan Tower and concludes with Brahms' second symphony, a work so sunny and pleasant that Brahms — always the prankster — joked to his publisher, "I have never written anything so sad."

### An Evening in Finland May 22-24, 2026

SIBELIUS: *The Swan of Tuonela* GANDOLFI: Violin Concerto SIBELIUS: Symphony No. 2

Both the composer Jean Sibelius and the swan have appeared on Finnish currency. Sibelius often looked to this majestic bird's soaring flight patterns and haunting cries for musical inspiration. In *The Swan of Tuonela*, he invokes the plaintive call of the English horn as the voice of the swan in the land of the dead in a Finnish folk legend. To complete the FWSO's season, Concertmaster Michael Shih steps into the spotlight for a brand-new concerto by American composer Michael Gandolfi before the orchestra concludes with another work by Sibelius, his soulful second symphony.

Near the end of his long and illustrious career, a weary Brahms told his publisher that it was "finally time to quit composing." And then, he met the clarinetist Richar Mühlfeld, whose dark, woody sound and stellar musicianship inspired a quartet of new chamber works, including the trio for clarinet, cello, and piano. Also on the program are a pair of French gems: Poulenc's graceful and ironic flute sonata and Ravel's Introduction and Allegro for Harp, Flute, Clarinet, and String Quartet, a work that so enchanted audiences that the musicians immediately played it a second time at the premiere.

The range of the French horn was once limited to certain notes and scales before the addition of valves. Beethoven's Natural Horn Sonata, written for one of the best horn players of the day, defies this reality with virtuosic arpeggios and scales whizzing up and down the instrument. Meanwhile, Schuman wrote his Piano Quartet in E-flat Major for piano, violin, viola, and cello with his wife Clara in mind for the piano part, while the last of Ligeti's Six Bagatelles for Wind Quintet was censored by the Soviets for being too "dangerous."

Chamber Music: Mozart, Beethoven, and Schumann

In 1814, Beethoven's deafness was growing more severe even as his star as a composer was rising. He dedicated his "Archduke" trio to the Archduke Rudolph of Austria and played the piano part himself. While the piece was well-received, Beethoven struggled to hear his fellow musicians and compromised the performance — this was his last performance as a pianist. There isn't a trace of introspection in the work, however, which bursts with straightforward good humor and optimism. Mozart's Horn Quintet is similarly cheery, while Schumann's *Fantasiestücke* for oboe and piano are more introspective and freeform.
